Post Scripts

Regarding the quote of the month, I find it to be a wonderful suggestion by Martin Luther to take some prayerful time around the story of Jesus' birth. Not simply rush through it and check it off like an item on a shopping list (green beans, roast, Nativity Reading, ice cream, furniture polish...) Not that many people actually do that, but with all the flurry of things around this time of year, I get Luther's "drift" in this matter, and I gladly take on the challenge he gives. This is what we do at worship these days.

Listen again to Brother Martin: "The heart will not laugh or be merry. As spray does not touch the deep, so mere meditation will not quiet the heart."

During Advent we take four weeks to "go deep" into the run-up for the Christmas story; we then have two more weeks to celebrate His arrival. It seems to me that taking time to cherish the story of Jesus brings great benefits, to comfort our troubled hearts as only the Gospel can do. It does take some attention. Each year we provide Advent devotional materials for people to use in this deepening way. It only takes a few minutes each day.

Into this reality comes the promise of Immanuel, "God with us", baby Jesus, "born that man no more may die" as the Herald Angels report in our famous Christmas hymn that has them singing "Hark!" The word means "Listen!" So we ditch our current and future troubles to take time, as Luther compels us to do, and pay close attention to the story of Jesus' First Coming in Bethlehem, His Current Presence Among Us Now, and His Promised Second Return to gather all things together for the Next New Phase of Reality Forever. That's part of my meditation about all this; I encourage us all to dig deeply into a familiar and yet always new announcement of Glad Tidings upon us. Now. Here.

"How glad we'll be if it is so! With all the shepherds let us go!"

Advent, Christmas, & Epiphany

We are now into the festive time at then end of one calendar year that moves nicely into the new year! Stick with me as I move us through the "high" points:

As the Church counts time, Advent (which means "to come") started us out—for 2017—on November 27, 2016, a bit more than four weeks earlier than the start of the calendar year (January 1, 2017). Christmas is a very short season with two Sundays after its beginning (December 24 & 25), the "twelve days" that take us into the Epiphany (January 6, which means "manifestation"), the celebration of the Magi/Wise Men visiting baby Jesus. Okay so far?

What follows that is a season of Epiphany Sundays that can be as short as four (like last year), or as many as eight, depending on other calendar considerations, including the Judaic ways of counting the seasons, culminating at The Transfiguration of Our Lord (this year on February 26, 2017. (Some traditions have all this moved ahead by six months, but that's a different story...).

In addition to those days mentioned above, several feast/commemoration days also help mark this time of year in a holy way: for many Scandinavians, December 13 is St, Lucia ("Santa Lucia") Day; December 26, St. Steven, Deacon and Martyr; December 27, St. John, Apostle and Evangelist; December 28, The Holy Innocents (slain in Bethlehem by Herod trying to kill baby Jesus); and, The Baptism of Our Lord (first Sunday after January 6, Epiphany). We could add "lesser" festivals along the way (including The Confession of St. Peter, January 18, The Confession of St. Paul January 25, and Candlemas/Presentation of Our Lord on February 2).

But we need to ask the question: why does any of this matter? My answer, simply put, is that in our age of holidays driven by retail, politics, and sports interests, it matters that people of faith mark the time with the events and people of faith throughout the ages. This is part of our story that we witness to, and that we are a part of now! At least, that's how I look at it (besides. I get a kick out of this!). When Sunday and Wednesday services coincide with days like those mentioned above, all year around, our worship services will reflect these things, gladly, and you ae encouraged to take part.

Giving Opportunities

By Erik Post—An active, vital, and valuable church community is a good neighbor to those in need, both near and far. "Income streams" include the following: offering plate collections and mailed-in monetary gifts and tithes have always been the mainstay of providing for our ministry needs. We are exploring the implementation of online giving too. Individuals and groups that benefit from using our facilities provide donations regularly, and are very grateful for maintaining our ministry "footprint" in Springfield.

Other ways that expand our reach for the Gospel include our <u>SLC Trust Fund</u>. It does a great job of helping in significant ways. Many benevolences, over the years, with the interest from investments are managed and distributed by our fine Trust Committee. People's lives are changed in good ways, and as part of our annual celebration of being a good neighbor, a list of those benevolences is available for us to give thanks about. We are so grateful for this wonderful part of our expression and sharing of God's grace!

Now, in addition to the benevolent activities of the Trust Fund, a "Leave a Legacy Fund" has been approved, through council action and an affirmative vote at last year's annual meeting. The purpose of the Leave a Legacy Fund is to help the congregation with ongoing expenses that cannot be gathered only by the generosity of weekly collections of the offering plate, and the other sources mentioned above. This also provides a "cleaner" way to meet our ministry needs of property and personnel rather than by borrowing from sources otherwise dedicated.

A few years ago, many of you may remember, our 30-year old roof needed replacing. Through a one-time "loan" by the Trust Fund, and by your contributions, we replaced the roof, and paid back the Trust Fund ahead of schedule. Thanks be to God! Yet it was awkward, to say the least, to use our benevolence resource monies in that way, as many of you indicated. So, why not provide a different fund, if possible, independent of the necessary restrictions already in place with the Trust Fund?

The Leave a Legacy Fund is one answer to that question. With the generous gift from the estate of one of our beloved members, people want to see our ongoing Springfield Lutheran Church ministry continue. We can be encouraged to contribute either now, or by bequest, to either the benevolent Trust Fund or the Legacy Fund so that we can meet future expenses as they arise.

The money deposited so far is being managed and gains interest through the Mission Investment Fund of the ELCA. When ministry needs of property or personnel arise, our church council now has the capacity and obligation to use properly those Legacy Funds as needed (e.g., say we need a new furnace), so that there can be adequate funds available without needing to rely only on individual generosity and can leave the Trust Fund to do its benevolent work uninterrupted.

Please consider prayerfully how you can keep existing offering "streams" flowing with the current options available, especially including the new option of the Leave a Legacy Fund that can help ensure our valuable presence for the Gospel both now and into the future God is leading us into!

Ordination Thanks

By Erik Post—I am very grateful for the fine Trinity icon that you gifted me with as part of recognizing 30 years since ordination! The cards and other gifts are also very much appreciated! And lasagna, carrot cake, cheese-cake, lots of well-wishes (and good jokes)—all done without a "roast"—I am truly thankful!

Every year since November, 23, 1986, I take some time to review and reflect about the vows I took on my ordination day at St. Timothy Lutheran Church, Portland. It's a helpful and humbling activity for me: helpful in that it keeps me grounded in what I am supposed to be about as a pastor, and humbling because being ordained is not about me, it's about God.

At the time of ordination, and after the opening sentences and Bible passages comes this first question: "Before almighty God, to whom you must give account, and in the presence of this congregation, I ask: Will you assume this office, believing that the Church's call is God's call to the ministry of Word and Sacrament?" The response that I gave (along with all my colleagues over the years) is this: "I will, and I ask God to help and guide me." See, I'm there, in service to God...a good thing to keep in mind. It's a call, I'm not simply a "hired hand".

Of course, as I say, "yes, help and guide me, God", in my head I am also saying the holy equivalent of "Gulp!" or something like that...but I got prayerfully past that stage for the rest of the service.

A series of other questions follow, equally important, that ask me if I will preach and teach in accordance with the Holy Scriptures, Lutheran Confessions, and Creeds of the Church; be diligent in study, pray for God's people, nourish and lead them with the Holy Sacraments; and lead "by your own example in faithful service and holy living", and will I as a pastor "give faithful witness in the world, that God's love may be known in all you do?"

You look at those requirements and you think, sometimes, why would anybody in their right mind agree to, let alone seek, such incredible things?

Of course I responded and continually review/acknowledge, "I will and I ask God to help me." The presiding bishop then prays "almighty God, who has given you the will to do these things, graciously give you the strength and compassion to perform them." Key point here: God gives strength and compassion, "graciously".

There are more prayers and scriptures that follow, along with promises of the congregation (and family and friends gathered there) to pray for and support me, too, all equally part of the Rite of Ordination. I was presented with a Bible, a communion chalice, and a stole (actually a whole set of stoles graciously made by Irene Borchers) as symbols of the office of Word and Sacrament.


I have a photo album that chronicles all of that day, "bitter-sweet" now in the sense that many of those present all those years ago are now in the eternal care of God (including my parents and many church members from my home congregation). Most of us in the photo album have gone on with our various lives, of course. It kind of tugs at your heart, you know?

Well, there's more to it than that. I just thought you might want a little glimpse about why it was important to mark that Sunday, and again thanking you for support and prayers in this calling, and asking for forgiveness where I mess up, and so away we go together, here: by God's grace as God leads. Soli Deo Gloria! ("To God alone be the Glory!")
