Post Scripts

By Pastor Erik Post—""He is Risen!" is a phrase we will say now for some six+ weeks; actually, during the "Great Fifty Days" of Easter. The practice of the Church, for some centuries in the past, was to use this time between Easter and Pentecost to incorporate the newly baptized members into the life of the congregation. Sponsors and prayers and rites all worked together to help bring people into fully active discipleship.

Some of our brothers and sisters around the world still mark their time together in this way; the recovery of the "Catechumenate"--what this process of adult instruction and entry into the Christian faith is called-has gained some traction here in America, even among some ELCA churches I am aware of. (Ask me about it).

How times have changed! Many people (even within the Church) will acknowledge they never heard of any "days" of Easter, let alone fifty of them. Easter is one Sunday, right? It's followed often by the deadline for filing taxes. The next celebration may be May Day, or Cinco de Mayo, or Mother's Day (let's not forget or Sittende Mai, Norwegian Independence Day) or finally Memorial Day...

I'm not going to whine or scold people about the lack of observance of our Easter season of Sundays. It has gotten simply left out of our spiritual and/or cultural cycle of doing things, for a variety of reasons. Just to practice Lent and Holy Week as we just did, including Holy Saturday/Easter Vigil, is a huge leap for many.

Be at peace. What I will do: pray about and personally encourage these fine Springtime days after Easter to have SLC people commit/re -commit their hearts, talents, treasures, and activities to the life of our Springfield congregation. Between now and Pentecost Sunday, May 15, decide to bring yourself and someone else weekly to learn firsthand about the life-changing message of what we proclaim when we say "He is Risen!" Let's dare to ask and answer what it means to have our lives changed by the Risen Lord, so that we humbly "walk the walk" and not simply settle for "talking the talk" of the Resurrection.

I kind of like that, unsettling as it is. My life and yours, and our world, certainly need that Resurrection claim brought out with courage and energy as the Spirit leads us. Here? Yes? Now? Absolutely! By me and by you, together in Christ ...

"He is Risen Indeed, Alleluia!"

SLC Quilting Schedule:


We have two groups here at SLC. SLCW LWR Quilters and the Springfield Lutheran Sewing Sisters (SLSS).

- Service—What can you do? Volunteer to help the little old lady cross the street or reach a can of tomatoes on the top shelf of the grocery store. There's a million ways to volunteer and a million agencies that would like your assistance...Meals on Wheels, Eugene Mission to name two...our very own quilters are already volunteering for LWR and Foster Kids and Catholic Community Services...what else can we DO?



Monday Night Bible Study

By Pastor Erik—In the weeks of Sundays after Easter many of our lessons are from the Revelation/Apocalypse according to St. John. So what is Revelation about, and how does a Lutheran approach to this fascinating last book in the New Testament give us valuable clues to what it may mean? Starting Monday, April 4 at 6:30 p.m., come join our merry group study! We will be using as a guide Eric D. Baretto's book about Revelation; here is a "teaser" for you:

"Revelation is a rich book of the Bible to study. God is profoundly concerned with the plight of the world, and faithful even amid the ordeals, tribulations, and plagues of the present and future. God is also exalted in the highest heavens, and brings about a renewed creation. In the end, the promise that Jesus will return is reason for hope, anticipation, and expectation."

This eight-session course explores selected passages from Revelation.

Sessions include:

- 1. Revealing Revelation (Revelation 1:1-20)
- 2. Life and Faith in Pergamum and Laodicea (Revelation 2:12-17, 3:14-22)
- 3. Visions of God and the Lamb (Revelation 4:1-6a, 5:1-10)
- 4. Destruction and Protection (Revelation 6:15-7:17)
- 5. The Great "Battle" (Revelation 12:1-17)
- 6. The Fall of a Great and Powerful Empire (Revelation 18:1-24)
- 7. Our New Home is Here But Not Here (Revelation 21:1-8)
- 8. Jesus Is Coming, Soon (Revelation 22:8-21)

Of course, we will also use additional resources available to us, so come with expectation and your own insights. Find answers to enlighten yourself and others, biblical approaches for this book and others like it. Together we will grow in faith and understanding about Revelation!

Shhh...

Many of us may have heard (or said) these phrases: "Silence in the studio!" -"The dinner table is a place for eating, not talking!" - "Children should be seen, not heard!" As such, the idea behind silence can be one of command, or threat, with some sense of consequence--usually unpleasant--implicitly obvious or understandable with some further explanation.

And, on the one hand, we do live in a world of noise, and sometimes we get a "sensory overload" of a continual bombardment of sound(s). On the other hand, a lot of folks have the TV or radio or earplugs on to, paradoxically, replace the ongoing assault of sound with some noise of their own choosing. So in some way or another, sound "rules the roost", as it were; in fact, as I have mentioned before, where I live a rooster or two rule the early morning quiet, quite without my permission! I have gotten used to the occasional train passing by, though, and hardly notice it coming by not 100+ yards away.

The value of silence in the church can be seen as one alternative to either the awful commands to keep quiet, or the onslaught of sound that is both of our choosing, and what goes on around us where we have no choice in the matter. It is always fascinating to me to see how silence at worship is received, and practiced. For example, during Lent (and Advent) we purposely practice silence as a part of our Brief Order of Confession and Forgiveness. So how much time do we spend in quiet reflection about our broken nature, our sins and shortcomings to offer to God for the absolution from God's grace, the word of Forgiveness that I gladly announce to you at worship? Some folks, happily, asked for MORE time of silence this past season of Lent because you told me you were "just getting started" with the silence during Confession. I say GREAT! The evening mid-week services during Lent (and now) highlight the use of silence at worship, both before and during the time we are worshipping. Some recent studies indicate that we 21st century citizens have an attention span of about eight(!) seconds. Actively paying attention to a task has been whittled away to eight seconds-practicing silence at worship, then, also puts us into a "zone" of selfexamination, and that feels uncomfortable, at the least. Because what do we "do" with that interior "noise"? Our Lord Jesus tried to practice and model a way of silence to enhance his connection/relationship with the Father. Often it didn't quite work out that way as he wanted, but he persisted anyway. Monastic communities throughout the centuries have become adept at silence, too. Martin Luther is said to have practiced prayer, which included silence, for TWO HOURS as necessity before he even started his "regular" daily activities.

So here's a word for silence: PLEASE practice silence when asked to do so at worship, not because we *have* to, but because we *get* to offer a valuable alternative to the clammering commotion of our world, both in our interior minds and hearts and from the exterior busy-ness surrounding us. If you see someone at worship in silence, for their sake and yours, leave them be. Sit quietly near them if you like; refrain from bustling with coats and bags and whatever, or even trying to say "hello". It can wait. Instead, why not be quiet yourself, or listen to our beautiful preludes and offertories given by the musicians. If you have something to say, consider keeping it to yourself until a later time. Certainly, be gregarious before worship, and by all means at the sharing of the peace—I'm not asking for a return to grumpiness at church, by any stretch! But let's show some careful attention to the value of silence, and let the quiet be respectful of the place we are at—God's "house"—and those who come for something of an oasis, if you will, from the way-too-noisy lives we lead.—quietly yours, Pastor Erik
