Post Scripts

The old saying, "April showers bring May flowers", was (and is) certainly true for many years, in many places. Yet, in western Oregon, it may be more accurate to say "April showers bring--May showers...." The idea behind such a saying is one of predictability, and continuity, even if it's "more or less" than accurate (especially in a drought year like last year was).

The same can be said of many claims within the history of the church, too. For several weeks now, following Easter Sunday, we have been saying "Alleluia! He is Risen!" "He is risen indeed. Alleluia!" Being able to say such things about Jesus relies on what was first proclaimed about him, and for thousands of years believers all around the world have echoed that claim. There is a predictability, a continuity with saying such things. Good!

With Jesus' resurrection (and remembering his Ascension, May 5) we certainly are talking about matters more important than weather reports, whether showers occur in April or May or whenever. We are announcing a claim about a truth concerning God and you and me and all creation. Not much room for "more or less accurate", right? Take a moment and let that "sink in" to your heart. The Apostle Paul said that if Christ weren't raised from the dead, we would of all people be most to be pitied.

Yet believers are to have the courage to announce Jesus' continuing presence, especially when it's not easy to do so. The way we observe time in the church, for example, makes it easier for us to worshipfully announce the resurrection during the season of Sundays after Easter. Great! We do that very well. Now into the "rest of the year" we are to become what many have called "Easter People": those whose lives show a day-to-day announcement that Jesus lives and makes a difference in who I am, who we are...

A statement attributed to St. Francis may help here: "Preach the Gospel; if necessary, use words." Whether he actually said that is up for grabs, but it certainly is in continuity with, and predictably accurate about, the kind of thing he would say. Within our lives --right now-- we have the opportunity to live the Easter claim about the Risen, Ascended Lord Jesus. The ongoing gift of the Holy Spirit brings about the power and compassion of God in our lives in ways we couldn't imagine on our own. Let that "sink in," too.

May we, my fellow "Easter People," continue to find ways of being living, breathing, vital expressions of the Risen Lord Jesus. Ask yourself: what would that look like in my life? In our lives together at SLC? Please ask me about that, too, if you like, and let's be open to some rich and powerful answers that will come our way.

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Meet & Greet Dorothy Carlson

Yes, in her 88 years, she has been a lifelong Lutheran, involved at SLC since 1952, and active in many ways of church life after being "recruited" by Pastor Odegard. Teaching Sunday school, choir participation, and quilting are important parts of her church "list". She has been a part of council and women's organizations, a trusted confidant and source of wisdom for years. We know those things about Dorothy, and it is a blessing that goes in many good directions. Yet did you also know these things about her:

*as a young woman (she admits to being a "tomboy") she played on a women's softball team (a Fargo/Moorehead team apparently sponsored by—gasp!— Hamm's beer...almost scandalous for Lutheran/Norwegian piety). The team played in the national championship tournament but was ousted by a another team. She continues to be interested in U of O women's softball—and is a big Duck fan of most of their sports.

*her mother was quite a seamstress, made clothes for her and sister Norene, and was a very good cook, too, but didn't let the girls much into the kitchen. Nonetheless Dorothy gained proficiency in her favorite cuisine: Scandanavian (surprise!), including lutefisk, pickled herring and pickled pigs feet; I can attest to her proficiency especially with lefse...At home she chopped wood for the stove and furnace; she speaks highly of her father who was continually busy making improvements in their home, especially on Bailey Hill Road, noting how he even made a basement there "one wheel-barrel load at a time".

*Dorothy and husband George traveled through many parts of Oregon, United States, and much of the world: most European countries, Russia, China, Japan (for some years) and other parts of Asia, New Zealand, and Australia. She visited both Norwegian and Swedish relatives, too.

* Favorite book: Heidi; favorite book of the Bible: Ruth; favorite movie: The Sound of Music (favorite Lutheran Easter hymn, "Lift High the Cross", but you knew that). Best present ever: a bicycle that she shared with Norene. She always had dogs at home growing up (no "indoor" ones, they always stayed outside).

Sunday, April 24, she was recognized by the congregation for her close connection and participation in the quilting ministry of SLC. Her leadership in this effort is remarkable, and she modestly claims she has always been more of a "utilitarian quilter than an artistic one". Yet there is a genuine, often whimsical, and simple quality of beauty in those quilts coming through clearly in one of the "warmest" Sundays of the year, thanks to the care of the Tuesday morning "Quiltsville" quilters and our honored and well-respected church member, Dorothy Carlson.

The Ascension of Jesus Christ

Edited by Pastor Erik Post—The Ascension of Jesus Christ (celebrated May 5) into heaven is recorded in Mark 16:19-20, Luke 24:36-53, Acts 1:6-12, and 1 Timothy 3:16. Forty days after his resurrection, Jesus called his 11 apostles together on the Mount of Olives, outside Jerusalem...Then Jesus was taken up, and a cloud hid him from their sight. As the disciples were watching him ascend, two angels dressed in white robes stood beside them and asked why they were looking into the sky. The angels said:

"This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven." (Acts 1:11, NIV)

At that, the disciples walked back to Jerusalem to the upstairs room where they had been staying and held a prayer meeting. Points of Interest from the Ascension of Jesus Bible Story:

- In the Bible, a cloud is often the expression of God's power and glory, as in the book of Exodus, when a pillar of cloud guided the Jews in the desert.
- Earlier, Jesus had told the disciples that after he ascended, the Holy Spirit
 would come down upon them with power. At Pentecost, they received the
 Holy Spirit like tongues of fire. Today, every born-again believer is indwelt
 by the Holy Spirit, who gives wisdom and power to live the Christian life.
- The command of Jesus to his followers was to be his witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the ends of the earth. The gospel first spread to the Jews, the Samaritans, then to the Gentiles. Christians have a responsibility to spread the good news about Jesus to all who have not heard.
- The ascension of Jesus is one of the accepted doctrines of Christianity. The Apostles' Creed, Nicene Creed, and Athanasian Creed all confess that Christ ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God the Father.

Pentecost History

Edited by Pastor Erik Post—Shavuot - Feast of Weeks, Hebrew Origins:

Pentecost or Shavuot has many names in the Bible (the Feast of Weeks, the Feast of Harvest, and the Latter Firstfruits). Celebrated on the fiftieth day after Passover (this year, it's May 15), Shavuot is traditionally a joyous time of giving thanks and presenting offerings for the new grain of the summer wheat harvest in Israel.

The name "Feast of Weeks" was given because God commanded the Jews in Leviticus 23:15-16, to count seven full weeks (or 49 days) beginning on the second day of Passover, and then present offerings of new grain to the Lord as a lasting ordinance.

Shavuot was originally a festival for expressing thankfulness to the Lord for the blessing of the harvest. And because it occurred at the conclusion of the Passover, it acquired the name "Latter Firstfruits." The celebration is also tied to the giving of the Ten Commandments and thus bears the name *Matin Torah* or "giving of the Law." Jews believe that it was exactly at this time that God gave the Torah to the people through Moses on Mount Sinai.

Throughout Jewish history, it has been customary to engage in all-night study of the Torah on the first evening of Shavuot. Children were encouraged to memorize Scripture and rewarded with treats. The book of Ruth was traditionally read during Shavuot. Today, however, many of the customs have been left behind and their significance lost. The public holiday has become more of a culinary festival of dairy dishes. Traditional Jews still light candles and recite blessings, adorn their homes and synagogues with greenery, eat dairy foods, study the Torah, read the book of Ruth and attend Shavuot services.

Festival of Pentecost, Christian Origins:

In Acts 1, just before the resurrected Jesus is taken up into heaven, he tells the disciples about the Father's promised gift of the Holy Spirit, which will soon be given to them in the form of a powerful baptism. He tells them to wait in Jerusalem until they receive the gift of the Holy Spirit, which will empower them to go out into the world and be his witnesses.

A few days later, on the Day of Pentecost, the disciples are all together when the sound of a mighty wind comes down from heaven, with tongues of fire resting on them. In Acts 2, we read that "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them." The crowds observed this event and heard them speaking in different languages. They were amazed and thought the disciples were drunk on wine. Then Peter got up and preached the Good News of the kingdom and 3000 people accepted the message of Christ! That same day they were baptized and added to the family of God.

The book of Acts continues to record the miraculous outpouring of the Holy Spirit that began on Pentecost... -- About.com was the source. Check the website for more information.


Camp Lutherwood Events:

Definition of the Trinity

The word "Trinity" comes from the Latin noun "trinitas" meaning "three are one." It was first introduced by Tertullian at the end of the 2nd century but received wide acceptance in the 4th and 5th centuries. The Trinity expresses the belief that God is one being made up of three distinct persons who exist in co-equal essence and co-eternal communion as the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

The doctrine or concept of the Trinity is central to most Christian denominations and faith groups, although not all.

All through the Bible, God is presented as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. He is not three gods, but three persons in the one and only God.

Tyndale Bible Dictionary states: "The Scriptures present the Father as the source of creation, the giver of life, and God of all the universe. The Son is depicted as the image of the invisible God, the exact representation of his being and nature, and the Messiah-Redeemer. The Spirit is God in action, God reaching people—influencing them, regenerating them, infilling them, and guiding them. All three are a tri-unity, inhabiting one another and working together to accomplish the divine design in the universe."

Here are some key verses expressing the concept of the Trinity:

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit ... (Matthew 28:19, ESV)

[Jesus said,] "But when the Helper comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth, who proceeds from the Father, he will bear witness about me." (John 15:26, ESV)

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all. (2 Corinthians 13:14, ESV)

The nature of God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit can be seen clearly at these two major events in the Gospels:

<u>The Baptism of Jesus</u> - Jesus came to John the Baptist to be baptized. As Jesus rose up out of the water, heaven opened, and the Spirit of God, like a dove, descended upon him. Witnesses to the baptism heard a voice from heaven saying, "This is my son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased." The Father clearly announced Jesus' identity, and the Holy Spirit descended on Jesus, empowering him to begin his ministry.

The Transfiguration of Jesus - Jesus took Peter, James, and John to the top of a mountain to pray, but the three disciples fell asleep. When they awoke, they were astonished to see Jesus talking with Moses and Elijah. Jesus was transformed. His face shone like the sun, and his clothing dazzled. Then a voice from heaven said: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him." At the time, the disciples did not fully understand the event, but today readers of the Bible can clearly see God the Father directly and powerfully linked to Jesus in this account.

Leave a Legacy

During the past couple of years, a number of our members have expressed the desire to have a way to "keep the doors open" for Springfield Lutheran Church. By that, they mean a way to contribute to an endowment, or fund, that is not limited to benevolence (like our fine Trust Fund), but can be readily accessed for use in ministry needs as varied as building maintenance or repair, staff support, and music ministry (to name a few requests that have been named).

Good news: in meetings last year, and at our recent annual meeting, our church council has explored the possibility of making such a giving opportunity available: a "Leave a Legacy Fund." Simply put, individuals may choose to give now (or leave bequest from their estate) to help with this endeavor. Rest assured, this is NOT a replacement for the current Trust Fund, but rather a parallel option to help continue ministry objectives into the future. A recent example: a few years ago we needed a new roof, and could have accessed from a "Legacy" Fund, rather than the awkward use of the Trust Fund (as we did use) to help pay for the project. Note: the money borrowed from the Trust Fund was entirely repaid in a quick manner.

What matters here is that an alternative fund, designated to help with ongoing needs and objectives, openly and carefully administered by council, can help steer Springfield Lutheran into the future without having to (a) access the Trust Fund, or (b) solely depend upon donations to get things done, be they potentially large projects (e.g., facility care) or ongoing ministry necessities. This is "pro-active" thinking! We already have some "seed" funds available to get things going.
