### **Post Scripts**

When I was in broadcasting (VERY briefly in the '70s) we had a phrase to describe what was "classic" rock and roll: "golden-olden-blasts-from-the-past"...Yes it's a dumb but helpful way to introduce a song by, say, Elvis ("Jailhouse Rock"), or one by The Four Seasons ("Candy Girl").

This year at Springfield we reach a milestone of 70 years in ministry! And we are going to be announcing and celebrating these next few months by remembering special events and people along the way. More important and lasting than "tunes" are our own "golden-olden" moments and people:

- In May of 1946 the Articles of Incorporation were registered.
- July 7,1946 was the first worship service held in the old theatre downtown.
- The cornerstone was placed in 1948 for the first worship building (now the "East Wing/gym, you can see it for yourself).
- We have dedication programs and photos acknowledging the education wing, main sanctuary, pipe organ, 50th anniversary...the list goes on, particularly about structural milestones. And those are great!

We are also collecting and sifting through many photos of people and activities over the years. I am finding them to be even more compelling than archives about church structures. What I mean is that we, as Lutherans, have valued our buildings and rightly so, while at the same time making it clear that the Church is people gathered around Word and Sacrament. The pictures of worship services, Sunday school classes, Luther League, quilters, outings to the beach and rivers and mountains, service to our community and world, show the Church—people—in action. This is going to be good and fun, and an honor, to have celebrated 13 of those active years with you.

One thing I'm working on: We are always called to look forward; you can't put "new wine into old wineskins..."; looking "backwards" and thinking "our best years are behind us" is a trap to be aware of. *I get that.* Yet I have detected a not-so-subtle bias from well-meaning, but I think misinformed people, who think that the Present and the Future are the only places valid ministry can occur. (This column is too short to go fully into this wrong-headed idea). I find it odd, too, that some of those who write about these things "officially" are also ones that are (rightly!) promoting the 500th anniversary of the Reformation on October 31 next year. Ponder this, we must...

Let me at least begin the conversation: in our 70th year I think we have a huge goldmine of wisdom for the Present and the Future, because we manage to continue a connection with our Past. More about this in the months to come.

Right now, join me in giving thanks for how God has worked with us (as I say, sometimes even in spite of us!) for 70+ years of living for God's glory through Jesus Christ here in Springfield. This church has, does, and *will* bring about the Kingdom of God's Grace here. Peoples' lives are being changed in good and powerful ways—what a "blast" that is, golden-olden" or otherwise.

Here is a brief list of the standard projects that are always needed:


- School Kits/ Backpacks

## **Eugene Mission Update**

By Michelle Guillory—Thursday, June 16, the kitchen of the Eugene Mission burned to the ground...two days before their big fundraiser was scheduled. Just so you know, the Eugene Mission feeds 300 at breakfast, 200 at lunch, and 300 at dinner every day...800 meals per day! They were scrambling.

The outpouring from the surrounding communities has been breathtaking. Donations started pouring in immediately. Tons of volunteers showed up at the Eugene Food Truck Festival to support the Eugene Mission which allowed staff to work at the Mission and continue to sort out the direction of the Mission in the coming months.

They had a mobile kitchen on its way to enable them to continue as normally as possible while the kitchen is rebuilt. But, in the meantime, how do you feed 800 meals per day while the kitchen is in transit? You ask everyone you know to ask everyone they know and food starts pouring in.

I worked with their volunteer coordinator, Tabitha Eck, to arrange a chili feed...which was a huge success and greatly appreciated. We were scheduled to provide the dinner for Wednesday, June 22...and there was a minor snafu/blessing. We were quite successful in providing chili for 300 plus (one giant Vegan Black Bean Chili and seven (7) very different Meat Chilis, plus one Chicken Veg Soup), along with tortilla chips, cornbread, cheese, and onions...but apparently two other organizations decided that Wednesday was a good day to bring their meals as well.

They had enough food on Wednesday to feed 900 people! And when I went back for my pots two days later, it was all gone! Everyone felt so blessed by the gifts God had given them through us...they couldn't thank me enough...so, Thank You to the wonderful folks who helped me provide for those in need:

There are many things they are still needing to operate in the immediate future and over this transitional time between kitchens.

<u>IMMEDIATE FOOD NEEDS</u>: Canned meats, Hamburger patties, Hot dogs, Frozen hash Browns, Bacon/Sausage, Biscuit Cans/Frozen Biscuits, Cup O' Noodles, Top Ramen, Canned Soups (preferably larger cans), Butter, Cooking Oil, Coffee, Sugar Packets, Coffee Cups, Sturdy Paper Plates, Water Bottles.


IMMEDIATE EQUIPMENT NEEDS: Large Coffee Brewer (100 cups+), Large Drink Dispensers, Large Trash Cans, Commercial Restaurant Equipment of every kind including small wares, (Household items are not useful at this point given the volume of folks they serve each day.) Please contact the Mission prior to purchasing to ensure you're not buying a duplicate item.

There are many, many expenses which will only be covered by financial contributions so monetary donations are infinitely helpful during the transitional period (2-4 months) and to get our kitchen up and running. If so led, please donate at their main office on 1542 West

## "God's Work, Our Hands"

Springfield Lutherans are going be putting care boxes together for our Forest Fire Fighters throughout the summer. They could use some small comforts while protecting us. Some of the items we are asking to be donated here at church (there's a basket in the Narthex) include the following:

- Lip balm,
- Goldbond powder
- Deodorant.
- Merino wool socks.
- Tooth brushes & paste,
- Moleskin and medical tape.
- Antibiotic cream/Neosporin,
- Insect sting relief swabs
- Hydrocortisone/anti-itch cream,
- Individual (one use) vials of eye drops,
- And handkerchiefs/bandanas.

Where am I going with this? Along that very same hallway are a variety of containers that we at SLC collect items to fill...Pastor Erik and I are contemplating renaming it "The Hall of Giving"...what do you think? So here's this month's "Giving Opportunities":

- The three empty barrels are for Food for Lane County. They were recently
  emptied and now stand ready for us to collect for the various foodbanks in the
  area. Should you wonder what is good to bring in, there's a shopping list on
  the Narthex Table on your way to/from the Sanctuary.
- The yellow tote with the black lid is for the ARC. This bin is for clothes and other linens and it gets emptied weekly. So, when you're cleaning your closets and your linen cupboards, remember the ARC.
- The oval brass(?) tub is the collection point for Lutheran World Relief for their Personal Care Kits. So, bring full size bars of soap, tooth brushes, tooth paste, nail clippers, combs, wash cloths, and bath towels. The SLCW gathers these items to send on twice per year...we are now collecting in preparation for the Fall In-Gathering when we join with other churches around the Pacific Northwest to send our collections to the LWR for distribution throughout the US and the world.


